# History – Grainne Mhaol

# Gráinne Mhaol

Long ago lived a young girl called Gráinne Ní Mháile (Grace O'Malley). She had long black hair.



Gráinne lived on Clare Island, just off the West Coast of County Mayo. Her father was a rich chieftain and a sailor.



# Gráinne Mhaol

Gráinne loved to watch the galleys. She noticed the men rowing hard and the wind catching the big triangular sails.



She asked her father “Please father, I am old enough now. Let me sail when you go to Spain!”

Her father said “No Gráinne, it’s bad luck to have women on board. Your long hair would get caught in the ropes”.



## Hot History

An Irish galley was a wooden boat with oars and a triangular sail. The O'Malley galleys brought salted fish and animal skins to Spain and Portugal. The animal skins were used to make leather. The galleys brought copper, wine and figs back to Ireland.

Gráinne raced up the hill to her favourite spot, high up, looking out to the sea. She felt the breeze on her face and made a plan.



The next morning, Gráinne arrived just as her father was about to sail to Spain. She was dressed in a tunic and warm trousers, like a boy!

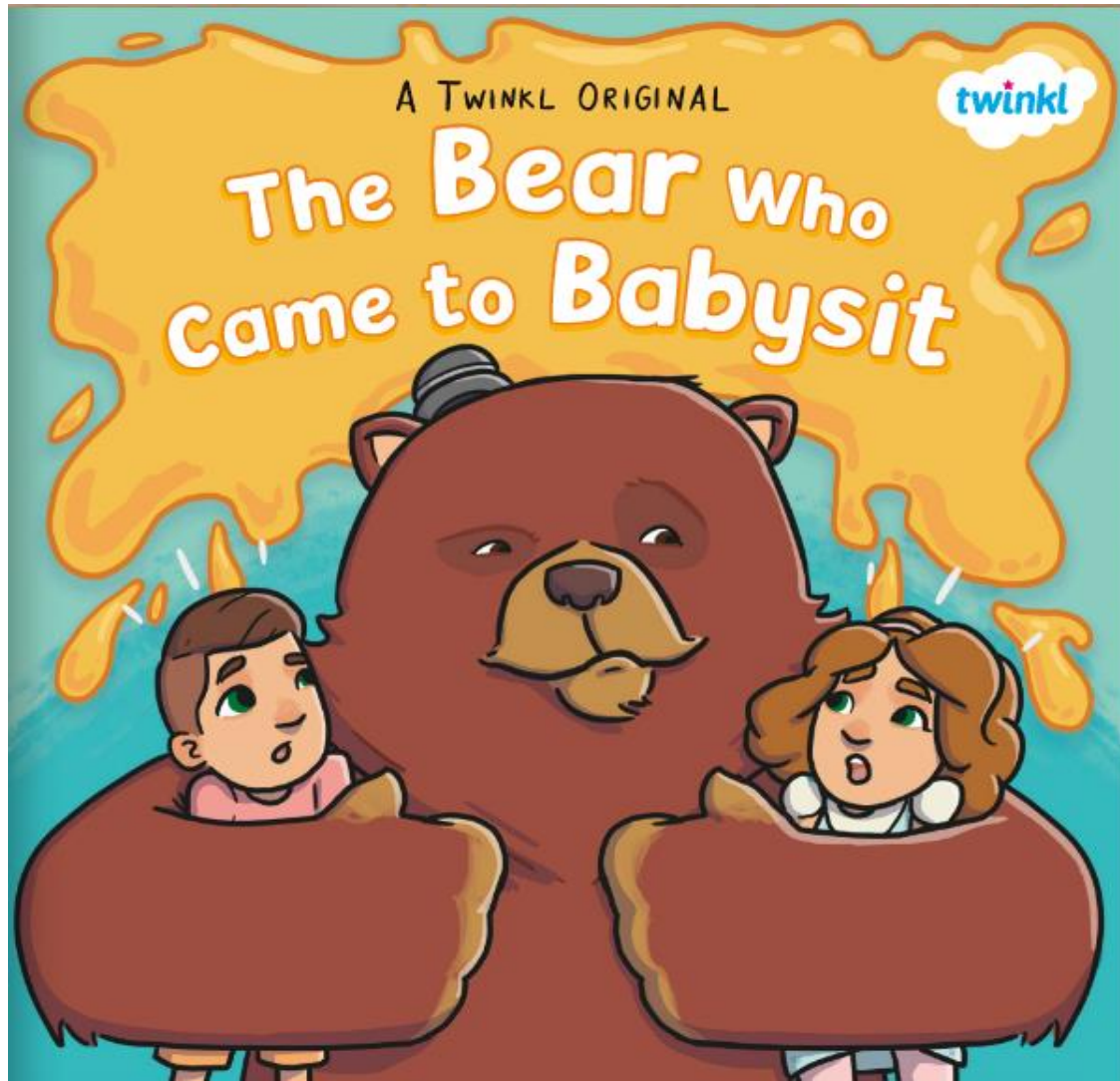

# Animal Homes: Foxes

**For this lesson we will be looking at foxes and their habitats!**

**Here are some facts:**

- They can run up to 30 miles an hour.
- Foxes are nocturnal, which means that they're usually up at night, when you're asleep.
- They eat just about anything: mice, rabbits, squirrels, birds, bugs and lizards. If they live near people, they might eat dog food or fruits and berries from your garden!
- A male fox is called a "Dog" Females are "Vixens" and babies are "Cubs" or "Pups".
- Foxes live in dens in the ground or old trees..
- Foxes have long, bushy tails and narrow faces.
- Foxes have large, triangular ears. These ears help them hear rodents scurrying about. Foxes have amazing hearing.

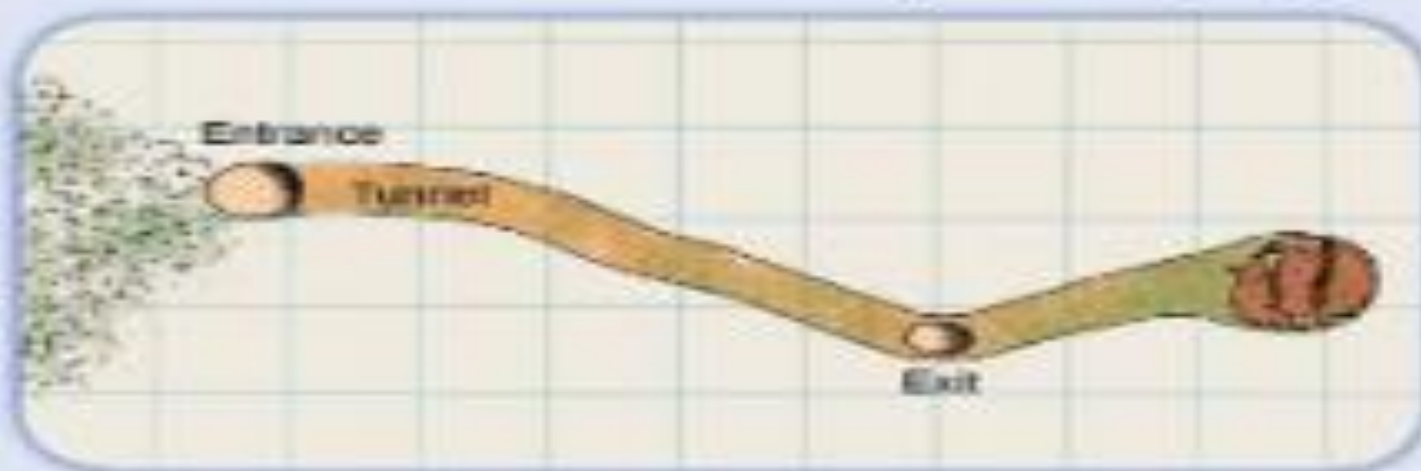

When a male and a female fox are going to have cubs, they move into a den called an earth. Their earth is often just an old rabbit burrow or badger sett. Sometimes foxes dig their own very simple earth.



The plan below shows what a fox's earth looks like. There is one main entrance about one metre wide, and one small exit. The foxes line the earth with grass, moss and dry leaves. Foxes are messy animals, but in spring, when the cubs are born, they clear out a lot of soil from the den. When the cubs are big enough to go outside, they trample on the soil and have a soft place to play.



When the foxes are not having cubs, they usually live under a shed, in the hollow of a tree or in a large drain. Sometimes they just sleep in a field with long grass. The fox wraps its bushy tail round its nose to keep itself warm.

# Try Out These Brain Breaks



## Brain Break Breathing

### Bubble Breaths

Breathe in deeply and form a bubble in your mouth. Your cheeks should be puffed out. Blow your bubble out of your mouth and push it away from you by blowing out hard and strong. Do this slowly and picture your bubble floating away. Keep breathing in and out deeply. Close your eyes and think about where else your bubble could go. Can you blow it far away? Can you blow it to a friend? Imagine your bubble is returning to you. Open your mouth and catch it for next time. Repeat.



## Brain Break Breathing

### Bumble Bee Breaths

Open your hands out with the palms facing towards your face. Place your thumbs over your ears and your fingers over your eyes. Close your lips with your teeth slightly apart. Inhale deeply through the nose and breathe in. Count silently 1, 2, 3, 4, 5.

Exhale slowly through your mouth and make a humming sound like a bee. Count silently 1, 2, 3, 4, 5. Repeat.
